Physician Lead, Health Equity Institute, Rhode Island Department of Health

Dr. Amobi is the Physician Lead of the Health Equity Institute at the Rhode Island Department of Health. Prior to her current position, she worked in non-governmental, state and national organizations focusing on women's health, violence prevention, and community engagement.

She received her bachelor's degree in anthropology at Princeton University, completed her medical degree at Harvard Medical School, and received public health training at the Harvard School of Public Health. She trained in Internal Medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital, where she has also served as academic faculty.

Rhea W. Boyd, MD Chief Medical Officer, 2-1-1 San Diego Director of Equity and Justice, The Children's Trust

Rhea W. Boyd, MD, MPH, FAAP is a pediatrician and child and community health advocate based in the San Francisco Bay Area. She works at the Palo Alto Medical Foundation and serves as Chief Medical Officer of 2-1-1 San Diego and as Director of Equity and Justice for The Children's Trust, a campaign to expand behavioral health access to every child in California. She also teaches about the relationship between structural inequity and health, serves on the board of California Chapter 1 of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and is a member of the AAP's national Executive Committee on Communications and Media.

Over the past five years, Dr. Boyd helped organize public health officials, community advocates and funders to address the impact of harmful police practices and policies on child and public health. She also worked with a San Francisco-based tech non-profit to increase access to social services across the Bay Area as a means of improving child and community health. As Commissioner of the Connecticut Department of Social Services (DSS), Roderick L. Senior Policy Analyst, New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services

Kelley Capuchino is the Senior Policy Analyst for the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services Bureau for Behavioral Health. In that capacity, she serves as the Administrator of the state's Building Capacity for Transformation waiver, leading primary and behavioral health providers toward continued health-care integration. She is working with school districts in North and South Carolina to strengthen trauma-informed education and advance a social- emotional development framework in PK-12 education. Senior Advisor, Strategic Initiatives and Policy, George Mason University Former Secretary of Health and Human Resources, Commonwealth of Virginia

Dr. Hazel serves as the Senior Advisor for Strategic Initiatives and Policy at George Mason University. Previously, he practiced orthopedic surgery in Northern Virginia until becoming Secretary of Health and Human Resources for the Commonwealth of Virginia in January of 2010. He completed his second term in January of 2018, after serving under one Republican and one Democratic governor. In that role, he oversaw 11 state agencies, including such diverse programs as Medicaid, Behavioral Health, Social Services, and Aging and Rehabilitation. These agencies accounted for approximately one-third of the state budget.

Among his current activities, Hazel serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Stewards of Change Institute. He became committed in SOCI's work as a result of his extensive work on data-sharing initiatives in an effort to better inform policy and budget decisions. The opioid epidemic and early childhood development are two areas of special focus for him.

As HHR Secretary, Hazel led the Virginia Health Reform Initiative and helped establish the Virginia Center for Health Innovation. He continues to serve as the Founding Chair of ConnectVirginia, the state's health information exchange. He also co-chaired the first Children's Cabinet in Virginia and the Governor's Task Force on Prescription Drug and Heroin Abuse. He advocated for strengthening the state's behavioral health system and for increased access to care for low-income Virginians. He has served as a Trustee of the American Medical Association, Speaker and President of the Medical Society of Virginia, President of the INOVA Fair Oaks Hospital Medical Staff, and Chair of the Medical Affairs council of the INOVA Health System.

Betsy Rosenfeld is the Regional Health Administrator (RHA) for the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health (OASH) for the six New England states. As the primary public health official for HHS in New England, she and her team are responsible for a broad portfolio of public health

work organized around addressing social determinants of health and health equity, including opioid dependence, community health worker (CHW) policy, women's health, racial justice, trauma-informed care, environmental health and infectious disease. Rosenfeld serves as the primary liaison for state and local public health officials as they interact with OASH, and her team regularly partners with community-based organizations, academic centers and health care providers to better-integrate systems of clinical and community care and improve outcomes.

Rosenfeld was a founding member of the New England Public Health/Managed Care Collaborative and the New England Asthma Regional Council, both of which were models for integrating upstream public health interventions into the reimbursement and health care delivery systems. She has worked in partnership with public and private payers to present the evidence base for covering preventive interventions as a mechanism for improving quality of care, reducing health care expenditures, improving workplace/school attendance, and strengthening community health outcomes. In addition, her office hosts the only regional network of CHW organizations and stakeholders in the nation.

Prior to federal service, Rosenfeld worked as a health care lawyer at Ropes & Gray in Boston, representing teaching hospitals and other healthcare providers. She also worked as a clinical legal services apprentice while in law school, representing low-income clients on healthcare matters. She graduated from Harvard College summa cum laude and from Harvard Law School cum laude, and has served on numerous nonprofit boards and committees.

Michael Wilkening

Secretary, California Health and Human Services Agency

Secretary Michael Wilkening has led the 12 departments within CHHSA since June 2018, with over 30,000 employees and an annual budget of about \$150 billion. Previously, as Undersecretary since 2008, Wilkening oversaw policy development and implementation, along with the operation of the agency. His role included streamlining government, improving operational efficiency, expanding healthcare coverage, integrating health, behavioral health and social services to promote whole-person care, and improving the delivery of services for people with developmental disabilities.

Wilkening has led efforts to improve government operations, better utilize data for service delivery, and make programs more client-centered through stronger partnerships across government, academia and non-profits. Under his leadership, CHHS became the first state agency to establish an Open Data Portal, changing how agencies interact with the public. Wilkening led a new, agile procurement process of the Child Welfare System that has become a model for other departments.

He also created an Agency Governance Council and Office of Innovation to accelerate the adoption of alternative ways of solving governmental problems and to foster agency-wide buyin to these efforts. In addition, while Undersecretary, he served as Acting Director of the

Department of Public Health, the Department of Developmental Services, and the Department of Child Support Services. In 2018, he was an inaugural winner of the Cliff Allenby award for excellence in public service. He is a frequent speaker at national health care, innovation and technology conferences.

David Wilkinson

Commissioner, Connecticut Office of Early Childhood

Dave Wilkinson is Commissioner of Early Childhood in Connecticut, where he directs a cabinet-level agency that administers state services for young children and their families, including child care, pre-k and multiple family-support services. Wilkinson has advanced results-driven, data-enabled approaches to achieving whole-family success, winning national recognition for innovations in outcomes contracting, cross-silo collaboration, data-driven services delivery, and for shaping policy and programs around customer experience and feedback.

Wilkinson is the former Director of the White House Office of Social Innovation, where he led efforts in the Obama Administration to identify and scale better, more-effective government services, advancing presidential priorities that strengthened communities and enabled upward economic mobility. He previously served the White House as Senior Policy Advisor for Social Finance and Innovation, assigned to the Office of Social Innovation and the White House Council on Environmental Quality. He drew from an extensive background in impact finance, social entrepreneurship, evidence-based policy and organizational management.

Prior to his work at the White House, Wilkinson served nearly eight years as Executive Director of City First Enterprises, a federally regulated nonprofit bank holding company and incubator of social finance solutions. Previously, he helped lead a successful effort to launch a community development bank in New Haven, CT, and has served as Executive Director of Common Cause New Jersey. He was selected by Next American City Magazine as a member of its Next American Vanguard, an annual "40 under 40" award honoring urban innovators. He is a graduate of the University of Virginia and Yale Law School.

Paul Wormeli

Board of Directors, Stewards of Change Institute Executive Director Emeritus, IJIS Institute

Paul Wormeli consults for government and the commercial sector in the application of information technology to public service. He has introduced innovative programs in public policy as well as innovations in the use of technology. He has been active in the development of software products, has managed system implementation for dozens of agencies throughout the world, and has managed national programs in support of advanced information sharing.

Wormeli served as Deputy Administrator of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration in the U.S. Justice Department, where he helped design the first mobile computing equipment sold in this county to law enforcement agencies. At Project SEARCH, he led the development of a common protocol for interconnecting diverse proprietary protocols to enable the nationwide sharing of criminal history information. He managed staff and wrote much of the Information Systems section in the report of the National Commission on Standards and Goals for Criminal Justice. He has been an advisor to the White House on security and privacy, participated in the drafting of Federal law on this topic, and responsible for the development of numerous state plans to implement the Federal and state laws on information system security and privacy.

Wormeli created and was the first full-time Executive Director of the IJIS Institute, a non-profit dedicated to engaging industry in helping government agencies improve information-sharing using advanced technology. In this capacity, he was the first Chairman of the NIEM Communications and Outreach Committee. He has served on the technical advisory committee for the Harvard School of Government Innovator's Network and on the NASCIO Information System Architecture Working Group. In 2015, he was awarded the Robert P. Shumate award for a lifetime of service to the law enforcement and justice community. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Electronics Engineering from the University of New Mexico, and a Master of Engineering Administration degree from the George Washington University. He is an adjunct professor in the College of Professional Studies at the George Washington University.

William York

Under his leadership, these teams built and launched the region's first CIE to bridge health and social services to address the social determinants of health and improve upstream impacts such as health outcomes, equity and quality of life through a collaborative and multidimensional platform that provides case planning and facilitated connection to services for providers and clients, ongoing resource navigation, data and outcomes. His stewardship of the CIE has gained national recognition for social and technological innovation, including establishing cross-sector collaboration, community partnership, engagement and interoperability among HHS providers.

Elaine Zimmerman

Regional Manager, Administration for Children and Families, Region 1

Elaine Zimmerman is the Regional Administrator for the Administration for Children and Families, Region 1 (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont). In this capacity, she partners with state, local, community-based organizations and tribes to promote economic and social well-being for children, families, individuals and communities. She currently leads an ACF/NCSL initiative entitled "A Whole Family Approach to Jobs," which is a multistate venture to put the family in the center, work across agencies and build an integrated system of supports and opportunities for families to exit from poverty.

Zimmerman was formerly the Executive Director of the Connecticut Commission on Children. She has devoted her career to developing and promoting model policy for children and families in health, safety and learning.
